On March 1, the Kitasp Humane Society's Animal Resous and Enforcement (KARE) unit resouled 46 cats and kittens from a couple hearding them in a camping braffer. The couple has approximately 30 more feines that XHS plans to return for but could not take at the time because of capacity limits at their facility in Silverdale. XHS is asking the community for help in adopting the cats and kittens as son as possible.



In mid-February, the Bremerton Police Department received an anonymous compaint about a large number of cats housed in a camping trailer. KANE made multiple efforts to contact the owners. On March 1, with the owners' compliance, officers took 46-cats from the trailer, with the intention of returning for the rest. Bremerton ordinance dictates that residents own no more than four animals.

Dr. Jen Stonequist, Director of Sheiter Medicine at KHS, examined the cats and said that most of them are in relatively good condition and sociatie. "Some had minor medical issues which are being addressed," she explained. KHS spayed or neutreed all of the cats aged eight weeks or older and will after the younger kittens once they reach eight weeks.

I watched as all of the other kitties from that awful trailer went to homes, but I didn't want to be put in a carrier or even be looked at, because I was still so very carreit and unsure.

Length of Time in Foster






Time to Interact


Approximately how long did it take until you were first able to interact with the cat?







Chirp
Rub
Knead
Touch

At front of cage
Tail up in air





Fearful vs. Feral?

Behaviors that Identified Socialized Cats if Performed any Combinations of Behaviors, 4 or More Times

Yawn

Groom/shake

Approach front of cage

Sniff

Roll

Reach

Still standing or still moving

Fear vs. Anxiety

Fear- an appropriate response to a fear inducing stimulus

Anxiety- profound physiological and behavioral response

Reducing Fear in the Shelter


Consistency



Step One: Reduce Stress!!









Gisele



8/5/09: These cats came in today from a construction worker who found them in the home a woman who had passed away. We could not obtain information on the owner. Stickered BLUE for fearful behavior on intake

11/4/09- adopted

Gisele



12/9/09 RETURN for fearful behavior in the home. Intake notes fearful behavior, hissing, and growling towards all family members and cat; notes that she bit the child in the home (child is 7 years old). Occasional house soiling noted once or twice a week. Has scratched and broken skin in the past 10 days, broke skin. Quarantine 10 days

Gisele- Fear Aggression



Identified as fearfully aggressive toward people

Placed in office foster

To gain more information about personality

Evaluate litter box habits

Gisele- Behavioral Management for Fear Aggression

Cats stay in office 24 hours/day
Create positive associations
Presence of people = food
Allow her to approach on her OWN
terms

Pet and touch only when she solicits it Interact for a few seconds and then take a break!

Gisele

Gisele did well in office foster
Started interacting with and enjoying pets
from caretaker/trainer
No further inappropriate elimination
Time to place for adoption!

Gisele was adopted on 1/2/10 (after being in the shelter for 24 days) to a shy, quiet couple


Gisele was shy in her new home Her equally shy owners were very understanding and patient


Gisele took several days to become comfortable in her new home, but did well and her adopters are very happy with her!




